I do not foresee us this year being able to offer anything like a normal programme of preparation. Having consulted our parish catechists, this is what I believe to be possible.

- If parents of children born before September 2013 are willing to prepare their child at home using the resources we recommend, they are welcome to do so, and we will support the parents as best we can.
- At the end of the preparation, we will arrange First Holy Communion for the children in twos and threes, as we did in 2020.
- For First Confession, whether we can have a group liturgy like we did in 2020 will rather depend on the number of children preparing, and the timing. Let's wait and see on this, rather than decide in advance.

Parents: If your child is eligible and you're willing to prepare them for the Sacraments, please let me know by the evening of Sunday 17 February.

Musings from my hermitage

The heart of the Gospel according to Mark is the person of Jesus.

In this Sunday's episode, the disciples respond not to an idea, but to Jesus; they set off, not to pursue abstract truth, but to follow Jesus. In the person of Jesus, God is creating his vision for us, humankind. The event to which the prophets of the Old Testament looked forward is taking shape: "The kingdom of God is close at hand."

But why the reading about Jonah? The Book of Jonah is one of the books of the prophets, and uniquely, it's all story: God wanted Jonah to preach in the metropolis of Nineveh; but Jonah ran off to sea; when the storm blew up, the sailors threw Jonah overboard to calm God's anger; Jonah was swallowed by the sea monster, and spewed onto the beach three days later, which brings us to the episode put before us this Sunday.

"Up. Go to Nineveh." Wiser now, this time Jonah went. He preached God's message in the urban sprawl; and it floored him that people listened. The people of Nineveh, who weren't God's chosen people, believed: they repented, changed; God saw their efforts and didn't destroy them.

The point being? If people who don't believe in the one true God can hear God's message and change, what about me? Hadn't I better see where God deserves a bigger say in my life, my values, the way I think, and talk, and do. The story of Jonah is still part of God's good news: that in Jesus the Kingdom of God is close at hand. When the prophet John the Baptist was arrested, Jesus began his ministry: This is God's time. Repent. Believe.

Repent — yes, being sorry for what I've done and failed to do. But much more. The Lord's call to repent demands that I re-think my priorities, change my heart and mind to allow God a fuller role in my life and how I live; allow God to shape my values, direct my relationships.

This is God's time. So: what holds me back from responding with all my heart? What do I allow to hinder my relationship with Jesus?
